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A message from the ECHO Ontario Superhub

ECHO programs in Ontario continue to meet providers needs by building learning communities that improve knowledge and confidence, and promote resilience. In 2021/22, there were **37** ECHO programs in Ontario, in the areas of autism, bariatric care, chronic pain, COVID-19, epilepsy, geriatric care, mental health, opioid use, and pediatric care. These programs were delivered through nine organizations: Baycrest, CAMH, Children's Hospital of Eastern Ontario, Holland Bloorview Kids Rehabilitation Hospital, The Hospital for Sick Children, Ontario Bariatric Network, Ontario Epilepsy Network, St. Joseph's Care Group and UHN. This year, ECHO programs in Ontario collectively reached **3702** diverse health care providers from **2032** organizations, showing significant adoption and integration of the ECHO model in the province.

The ECHO Ontario Superhub is a collaboration between the Centre for Addiction and Mental Health (CAMH) and the University Health Network (UHN). Working with the ECHO Institute in New Mexico and the Ontario Ministry of Health, the Superhub promotes high-quality implementation of the ECHO model, and supports alignment and integration across the ECHO community and within Ontario's health care system. This year the ECHO Ontario Superhub had the pleasure of delivering three separate virtual immersion trainings to **22** different ECHO hubs, and an annual conference connecting **135** health care and related professionals.

There have been some slight decreases in health provider participation over the last year. This follows record high numbers in the 2020/21 fiscal year. Even with a small decrease in participation, we have grown overall each year. In the past year, workplace burden and professional burnout have been well documented among healthcare providers globally. We will continue to monitor whether this has had an impact on availability to participate in ECHO. We balance this with participant feedback that ECHO remains a trusted source of community, knowledge, and support for health care providers in Ontario.

We thank our funder, the Ministry of Health, for its support and dedication to continuous improvements within our health care system, and its commitment to equity of care for patients. The Ministry's ongoing funding of the ECHO project means that more health care providers will be empowered to provide the right care, in the right place, at the right time.

What is Project ECHO?

Project ECHO (Extension for Community Healthcare Outcomes) is an innovative "hub and spoke" education model that aims to help healthcare providers build capacity in the treatment and management of complex health conditions. The model leverages videoconferencing technology to connect specialists with primary care providers, elevating knowledge and skills, enabling primary care to manage complex challenges in their communities.

The project works to:

- Empower healthcare providers to use best practices.
- Reduce the need for specialist visits.
- Improve quality of specialty care in Ontario's primary and community care settings.

Meet our Ontario ECHOs

2021/22 was our most impactful year yet.

In 2021/22, 9 organizations in Ontario delivered 38 ECHO programs on priority topics across the health system.

Children's Hospital of Eastern Ontario (CHEO)

ECHO Ontario Child and Youth Mental Health is a collaborative learning program through which primary care providers (PCPs) and mental health clinicians work together to care more effectively for children and adolescents with mental health problems. The program aims to change the diagnostic, prescribing, treatment and referral practices of PCPs, by providing them with evidence-based best practice guidelines and treatment recommendations, and linking them to community mental health agencies and services in their own regions.

Holland Bloorview Kids Rehabilitation Hospital

ECHO Ontario Autism aims to build province-wide community capacity to screen, diagnose and provide ongoing care to children and youth with autism spectrum disorder (ASD) in Ontario. The program hopes to reduce wait times for diagnoses by increasing the diagnostic capacity of community paediatricians, physicians and nurse practitioners. This will allow families greater access to timely diagnoses, closer to home. The program also aims to build capacity for the ongoing care of children with ASD, who may have multiple comorbidities. The overall goal is to reduce the need for diagnosis and ongoing follow-up at tertiary care centres, and thereby ensure that access to specialized care is reserved for the most complex cases.





Participants by practice type





We're sharing our successes with our partners for health

In 2016, with the support of Ontario's Ministry of Health, ECHO Ontario Mental Health at CAMH partnered with ECHO Ontario Chronic Pain & Opioid Stewardship at UHN and Queens to launch the ECHO Ontario Superhub.

The ECHO Ontario Superhub continued to provide guidance, training, and support for the replication, successful implementation, and maintenance of present and future provincial, national and international ECHOs. To date, the Superhub has supported the implementation of 56 ECHOs from 51 organizations across 4 countries.

Virtual Immersion Trainings Held (2021/22)

2 Half-day Virtual Immersion Training Events

Virtual Immersion takes place using Zoom video conferencing. This 2 half-day virtual training aims to provide in-depth, practical information about how to launch an ECHO and ensure high quality and fidelity to the model.

The agenda includes discussion about incorporating people with lived experience, evaluation & research, education, replication, implementation, IT, data and privacy, and facilitation. It also provides an opportunity for participants to run a mock ECHO session.

The ECHO Ontario Superhub promotes collaboration, fosters relationships and builds networks between ECHOs within Ontario, nationally and globally.

In 2021/22 the ECHO Ontario Superhub led the following initiatives:

- Facilitated the development of an ECHO Ontario consolidated annual report that highlighted the collective provincial impact from 29 ECHOs
- Launched a refreshed ECHO Ontario website
- Hosted monthly Project Manager meetings to share best practices, innovative ideas and program updates, including the development of a strategic plan








